Readmission to postsecondary institutions

Under the College Affordability and Opportunity Act, commonly referred to as the Higher Education Act, there are provisions guaranteeing the readmission rights for Service members. An institution of higher education may not deny readmission to a Service member who was a student but had to leave the institution to serve in the uniformed services, and the Service member must be promptly readmitted with the same academic status.

To qualify for readmission, the Service member must have served voluntary or involuntary service in the Armed Forces, National Guard, or Reserves on active duty, active duty for training or full time National Guard duty under Federal Authority, for more than 30 consecutive days.

An otherwise eligible Service member qualifies for readmission if:

- » the institution is given notice of absence for service
- » the cumulative length of absences does not exceed five years
- » the student gives notice of intention to return to school

The institution is not required to readmit the Service member if:

- » the institution determines that the student is not prepared to resume the study where the Service member left off
- » there are no reasonable efforts the institution can take to prepare the student to resume or complete the program of study

Base-sponsored NTCs exceed 150

The number of National Test Centers (NTCs) continues to grow as more bases convert to computer-based testing. A recent addition is the Base Education Center at Kirtland AFB, Albuquerque, N.M. "The Kirtland AFB facility is working very well and is smoothly integrated into the AF testing program," said John Malone, Chief Education and Training Section.

DANTES Test Sites migrating DSST, CLEP and ECE paper-based to computer-based testing continues to be a hot trend and is made possible with the base-sponsored NTC through a partnership with colleges on or near the base. The number of NTCs continues to increase as both education center staff and Service members take advantage of the many benefits of computerized testing. Not only does it provide increased security in exam delivery, candidates also enjoy greater flexibility when scheduling, and receive instant score results after testing. Secondly, Test Control Officers (TCOs) can focus their efforts on goals and tasks other than paper form ordering, administering, shipping and inventory, knowing that their Service members' educational goals are being met. Finally, for the institution hosting the NTC, it maximizes the use of their computers and generates funding to maintain and operate their facility.

With the simple, standard start-up process in place (MOU between base and school and a written agreement between the school and the testing agencies), DANTES encourages all bases to explore this opportunity and reach out to the school on or near the base to sponsor iBT DSST, CLEP eCBT and ECE CBT testing. Excelsior College examinations update

Be advised that the Excelsior College Examination American Dream (460) will be retired effective June 30, 2011. The last opportunity for candidates to take this exam in paper format will be during the June 17, 2011, National Test Date period. Order the paper version of this non-stocking exam through the established exam shipment process and return all used or unused copies of the exam to Excelsior College immediately after this testing period.

This exam will be administered in Computer-based test (CBT) format at authorized NTCs and approved DANTES CBT sites through June 30, 2011. Only exams administered on or before June 30, 2011, will be eligible for scoring, regardless of exam format.

Funding for ASE ends this fiscal year

The National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) has been a DANTES-funded program since the early 1990s. The ASE program began as a credit-by-examination initiative that offered American Council on Education (ACE) recommended credit for automotive mechanics interested in obtaining a college degree. Over the years, the program grew in popularity and drew more military candidates interested in obtaining the recognized certification credentials associated with the occupation.

DANTES will no longer fund this program after the May 2011 administration cycle. Test Centers will still be able to administer the ASE tests. The ordering procedures will remain same. Interested military personnel will fill out and submit the appropriate ASE paperwork along with a check that covers their registration and all examination fees (regular and recertification).

2011–2012 FAFSA Summary of Changes

The 2011-2012 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online application is now available at www.fafsa.ed.gov/. Detailed changes to the application can be reviewed at www.ifap.ed.gov/sumchngsappsys/attachments/111810ChangesAppProcessSys1112.pdf.

Summary of changes

- » Colors – The 2011–12 FAFSA colors are yellow for student information and purple for parent information. The student color of the FAFSA continues with the four-year color rotation of orange/green/blue/yellow.
- » Design – The design and layout of the FAFSA are consistent with the 2010–2011 FAFSA which was redesigned into a booklet format. Added instructional text for question 26, which asks about high school completion status.
- » Minor question wording changes – 26, 43d, 44i, 53, 54, 91d, and 92i.

Elements added

- » Question #27 added for applicants indicating they have earned a high school diploma. The question is worded as follows: What is the name of the high school where you received or will receive your high school diploma? Write in the high school name, and the city and state where the high school is located.
- » New Filtering questions determine the student's citizenship status and dependency status. Based on the student's status, FAFSA4caster presents subsequent entry fields, skipping questions that are not applicable.
- » On the FAFSA Web home page, a new interactive Deadlines link prompts the student to select his or her state of legal residence and the school year. General information about college deadlines is then displayed.

Data Elements deleted

- » Enrollment status question (formerly Question 31).
- » Plans to become a teacher question (formerly Question 32).

Other changes

- » New Browse Help option can be accessed from the navigation options at the top of the FAFSA home page.

- » From the FAFSA Web home page, students and parents can find and compare graduation, retention, and transfer rates for up to ten colleges at a time.
- » Enhanced login process – single point of entry for various FAFSA activities.

If you are a military member and need a paper copy of the FAFSA application, contact your nearest military education center; limited copies will be available.

The 2011-2012 paper format edition of FAFSA should be available late January or February 2011. Military Education Centers can order FAFSA materials (DANTES Stock #2403 and #2404) from the DANTES Distribution Center.

If you or your family has unusual circumstances that might affect your financial situation (such as loss of employment), complete this form to the extent you can, then submit it as instructed and consult with the financial aid office at the college you plan to attend.

College courses in high gear during Lincoln deployment

Sailors aboard USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) began a second college course term Nov. 12, reaching an enrollment of more than 400 students for the first two education terms during their 2010-2011 deployment.

“It’s always good to get a degree because you never know if you are going to stay in the Navy or not,” said Navy College Program for Afloat College Education (NCPACE) student, Information Systems Technician 2nd Class James Coggins. “You should continue learning, regardless of what you are doing.”

The Abraham Lincoln Carrier Strike Group is on track to have nearly 700 students participate in college-level courses during its deployment. This would put Lincoln well ahead of the 500 student achievement previously reported by USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) as the largest afloat education program on the East Coast.

The strike group’s first NCPACE term had 224 students enrolled, both in distance learning programs and instructor-led classes in English, philosophy, history, algebra and basic skills courses. The second term has 200 students enrolled in instructor-led classes. Lincoln’s educational service office (ESO) projected that the third term could have as many as 300 students.

Fast-track your CCAF degree completion - save time and money

Master Sgt. Michael Nienhaus, Air Force Reserve Recruiter assigned to the 7th Force Support Squadron, Dyess AFB, Texas, made the most of available opportunities to complete his Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) degree using the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) and the DSST credit-by-exam testing process. These exams are free to military members and available through a number of National Test Centers like the one at Dyess AFB sponsored by Coastline Community College. The electronic testing format allows for instant scoring and quicker updates on the CCAF Web Progress Report.

According to Nienhaus, he was motivated by two key factors: professional development and the need to find another career once his Air Force time is done. To prepare, he used online resources, including Online Academic Skills Course (OASC) (www.nelnetsolutions.com/dantes) and Peterson's free practice testing (www.petersons.com/airforce), as well as resources at the base Education Service Center.

"Earning college credit through CLEP and DSST, at no charge, is an amazing opportunity that more people need to take advantage of," said Nienhaus. "Having a National Test Center here is something that shouldn't be taken for granted. Not all bases have testing centers and if you have one at your location that you're not using, you're missing an opportunity that others would be grateful to have. I think you need to ask yourself what your educational goals are, and seriously consider that these tests are one avenue that can help you reach your goals much faster than the traditional approach."

Why CLEP and DANTEs testing?

"That's an easy one: time and money saved. By taking five tests, I saved myself an average of 72 weeks of classroom time. Taking a CLEP or DSST exam had a minimal impact on my schedule. By taking those five tests I earned 27 credit hours at a financial savings equal to \$6,750 or a year and a half of Air Force Tuition Assistance funds. I also saved at least \$1,350 in textbook costs."

Undoubtedly, Nienhaus' inspiring CCAF completion success story will resonate with many enlisted members. And, hopefully, they will be motivated to follow his example and will visit their Base Education Center to start their own path to success.
