2014 GED® program: No better time to test with DANTES

Do you need to finish your high school education? A GED credential will qualify you for many opportunities, including service in the U.S. military. Let the GED test change your life.



Members of the armed services may take the DANTES-funded GED test at official GED testing centers. Visit the DANTES Test Control Officer at your local Education Services Center to learn more about the DANTES requirements.

About the GED test

The 2014 GED test includes four subjects:

Subject	Items	Time Allowed
Reasoning Through Language Arts	51 questions	150 minutes
Social Studies	35 questions	90 minutes
Science	34 questions	90 minutes
Mathematical Reasoning	46 questions	115 minutes

Passing the GED test requires a minimum score of 150 on each of the four subject tests or 170 to earn GED with Honors. Once you pass all four tests, you will have earned the GED credential—the only high school equivalency credential recognized by colleges and employers across the country.

Where do I start?

Choosing to take the GED test is a life-changing decision. Getting good information from the beginning can guide your study efforts and make for a smooth testing experience.

1. Prepare for the test.

Service members are not required to take GED Ready™: The Official Practice Test, however all test-takers are encouraged to prepare for the 2014 GED test using test preparation resources.

GED Ready: The Official Practice Test is the best way for test-takers to find out if they're ready for the 2014 GED test. GED Ready is available in a computer-based format. It – and other study materials – can be purchased through the online student portal MyGED™ at <https://GED.com>.

Studying in a classroom with local adult education programs is also a good opportunity to get up to speed on the topic areas for the 2014 GED test. Find an adult education center through the GED Testing Service “locate a prep center” tool.

Free sample test questions and a free practice test can also be found in MyGED at <https://GED.com>.

2. Talk to the Test Control Officer.

The DANTES Test Control Officer (TCO) at your base education center can assist with online registration and scheduling, and help you identify official GED testing centers to take the GED test.

Only the TCO at your base education center is authorized to provide the DANTES-sponsored voucher code, which must be redeemed for payment prior to test administration.

3. Complete the 2014 GED test.

The computer-based 2014 GED test is funded by the DANTES-sponsored voucher program for eligible Service members. Service member registration and scheduling must be confirmed under the DANTES/ Armed Forces jurisdiction.

Military family members, supported U.S. citizens, and U.S. citizen family members are not eligible for DANTES reimbursement or voucher; however, they

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should register and schedule under the DANTES/ Armed Forces jurisdiction for credentialing purposes.

4. Add test results to your Service records. Service members may pay to order a duplicate official transcript if applicable and should consult their Personnel Officer to confirm the steps to have GED test score data entered into their Service records.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What is MyGED?

MyGED is the online student portal where you can access study materials, schedule your test, check your scores, learn about DANTES testing policies, and get information on transitioning to college and careers after the test. Visit <https://GED.com> today to create your free account.

Q: Can I take the test online?

No, the GED test is not available online and can only be taken at an official GED testing center.

Q: Where's the closest official testing center?

To locate a test center near you, log into MyGED and click on "Find a Center" or go to www.pearsonvue.com/ged/locate.

Q: What kinds of questions are on the test?

To see the types of questions on the test, review the computer-based GED test tutorial available in MyGED or go to www.gedtestingservice.com/2014cbttutorialview.

Reminder: End to OCONUS DSST paper-based testing

Prometric will discontinue OCONUS paper-based DSST testing effective July 31, 2014. The decision is based on a steady decline (44 percent over this past year) and the ongoing initiative to provide testing alternatives at fully funded National Testing Centers. Service members utilizing computer-based exams are able to access all 39 DSST exam titles and can see exam results upon completion.

DANTES will not fund any exam administered after July 31, 2014.

Dates to remember	
July 31	Last date to administer DSST paper exams
August 7	All DSST paper exams must be postmarked for return to Prometric (administered and unused)
September 30	Final date for Prometric to score completed exams (exams received after Sept. 30, 2014 will not be scored.)

DSST: there's an app for that!

The nationally recognized [DSST program](#), which offers military students a cost effective and time-saving way to earn college credits, has added an Android app to help test takers prepare for their exams. To download the free DSST Android app, visit <https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=prometric.dsst>.

The DSST app has two modes allowing users to prepare for all DSST exam titles and take a sample quiz, with results available immediately upon quiz completion. For preparation, the app provides users extensive information on each of the exam titles, including a description of the exam, the number of questions the exam contains and time in which they must be answered, exam content outlines, references and ACE-recommended passing scores.

DANTES, for over 40 years, has offered and supported voluntary educational programs on behalf of the U.S. Department of Defense. DANTES authorizes upfront funding of DSST exam fees for eligible military members at all test centers where DSST exams are administered.

Colleges and universities that are not current members of SOC should sign the DoD MOU as non-SOC members. Additional information will follow at a later date.




DANTES Pulse has a new home

TROOPS TO TEACHERS NEWS

Mississippi teacher uses his aerospace background to educate


Tom Powell, AP Physics and Sciences, likes to engage his students in many unique and creative activities, such as suspending a nail straight in the air on top a chain to demonstrate the flux of energy in magnetic fields, or putting students at the controls of a flight simulator in the Aerospace Science course at St. Martin's High School, in Ocean Springs, Miss. Powell registered with Troops to Teachers (TTT) after a twenty year career as an Air Force pilot. "Being a participant with Troops to Teachers was timely and advantageous for me because of the financial support I received to complete my teacher certification," he said.

Powell earned his advanced physics certification at the University of Georgia and credentials in engineering and robotics at Auburn University. He was responsible for creating curriculum and lessons in the subject fields of meteorology and aerospace science for his district and school, which was the first time these courses were taught for credit anywhere in the state.

The administration understands the value that life experience brings into the classroom. As a former military member with a lot of practical work experience while serving, he was able to harness this passion and share it with a new generation. Powell was awarded the Leo Scale award for his teaching excellence which provided him a generous stipend to purchase the flight simulators and build new computers for his classroom. He was also awarded Chevron grants which he uses for his robotics program, allowing his students to compete in the National High School Robotics Competition.

Powell focuses on the learning process between teacher and student and every day at school is an important day. He especially is proud of students who use the flight simulators he installed in his class, where they experience flying an aircraft and the challenges that come with it by landing at a typical airfield. Rocketry is also a particularly favorite lesson. Students calculated flight data through a Calculator Based Laboratory, learning to configure angles and triangulate grids so the rockets might land on designated targets.

He is very grateful to the TTT program for the assistance it gave him, and he in turn always encourages other Veterans to consider a teaching career, to Proudly Serve Again.

ACE and CEAI Service member and Veteran summit by HMCN (FMF/SW) David Acuff and Dr. Sandra L. Winborne

Last month, Dr. Sandra Winborne, DANTES program manager, and I attended the Service Member and Veteran Academic Advising Summit, hosted by the American Council on Education (ACE) and the Center for Education Attainment & Innovation (CEAI). Just prior to the opening of the Summit, a woman came to our table, introduced herself as “Molly,” and proceeded to talk to us about the work we do at DANTES. Later, the Summit began

with a welcome from ACE’s president — Dr. “Molly” Corbett Broad!

During her opening remarks, Dr. Broad spoke about why ACE was created and gave a brief history of the organization. She reminded Summit participants that the Emergency Council on Education (ECE) was formed in January 1918 as an emergency contingent to ensure World War I Veterans and the United States had a ready supply of technically trained military personnel to reintegrate back into civilian life and a struggling job market. In July of the same year, the ECE adopted the name ACE and invited institutions of higher education and learning to join the council to work toward the same goals of Veteran training, education and reintegration back into the civilian workforce. Today, ACE is the Nation’s most visible and influential higher education association.

The primary purpose of the summit was designed to develop strategies for expanding the reach of educational opportunities for active duty Service members and the Severely Injured Military Veterans (SIMV) program. SIMV directly supports wounded Veterans and their families by providing individualized advising focused on the exploration of career and educational options. This one-on-one support has proven highly successful as ACE has worked with more than 700 Service members and their families during the process of applying to, and gaining acceptance at, institutions of higher education. Through the success of this program and other similar work currently being conducted by other agencies, ACE believes that a consolidated effort can reach a larger number of potential military and Veteran learners while also increasing retention and attainment for the military student population.

During the summit, we were pleased to have the opportunity to discuss with individual participants DANTES programs/resources and initiatives that institutions and active duty Service members could strategically use to achieve their academic goals.

Counselors

One resource we discussed was the value of Service education counselors - both physical and virtual. Counselors can discuss with military members the many options and services available to them for pursuing their educational goals. Need help finding a counselor? JST

Dr. Winborne and I were able to promote the benefits for Service members of the Joint Service Transcript (JST) - that they may qualify for ACE recommended college credits from their military

ACE / DANTES Partnership

ACE represents accredited, degree-granting institutions: two- and four-year colleges, private and public universities, and non-profit and for-profit entities.

With this partnership, DANTES and ACE have collaborated with the DoD to review military training and experiences and recommend appropriate college credit for Armed Forces members. ACE credit recommendations are in the ACE Military Guide, the Joint Services Transcripts (JST), and Air Force transcripts.

ACE provides quality assurance and policy guidance for the JST used by the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, and Coast Guard. Over 2,300 colleges and universities recognize the JST as official documentation of military training and experiences and ACE credit recommendations.

The ACE Military Guide presents ACE recommendations for formal courses and occupations offered by all branches of the military, from 1954 to the present. All recommendations are based on ACE reviews conducted by college and university faculty members actively teaching in the areas they review. New courses and occupations are continually being evaluated by ACE, and these entries are added on a daily basis.

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training and experience. The JST is available FREE online for personal use or to request an official copy to be sent to accredited colleges and universities. <https://jst.doded.mil> (Note: Air Force transcripts are available through the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) and the Air Force Virtual Education Center.)

Credit-By-Exam

We recommended that Service members take advantage of DSST and/or College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams to reduce the number of classes they may need for their degree program. Military members can earn college credit for what they already know by making qualifying scores on introductory-level college subject examinations. Visit www.dantes.doded.mil/service-members/prep-for-college/earn-college-credit/index.html to learn more.

Kuder® Journey

Another program discussed with Summit participants was the availability of a career interest inventory through DANTEs. Some Service members may be unsure of what they want to study or pursue as a second career in the future. The Kuder Journey provides reliable tools to assess member's interests, and then suggest education and career options. It's another no-cost benefit for Service members. www.dantes.kuder.com

OASC & CPST

A discussion concerning college placement/entry tests and the need for some Service members to refresh their academic skills was brought up by the panel of five severely wounded warriors and again by representatives from various educational institutions. This discussion provided us the perfect opportunity to promote the DANTEs-sponsored Online Academic Skills Course (OASC) and College Placement Skills Training (CPST) programs, developed by Peterson's. Both OASC and CPST are designed for individuals who want to build their reading comprehension, vocabulary, and math skills to pass their exams, excel in their jobs, advance their careers, or continue their education. The courses are self-paced, with individualized lessons to increase proficiency in each of these academic areas. Participants may also choose an abbreviated review with shortened lessons through the online course. CPST and OASC provide lessons supported by interactive exercises, quizzes and practice problem sets, and helpful articles covering such topics as "How to Beat Test Stress" and "Last-Minute Study Tips" and offer detailed

tips and strategies for doing well on college entry and testing exams. Active duty Service members can access these programs via their Service portals (AKO, NKO, AF-Portal, and Coast Guard). Both courses are self-paced and online, and can be accessed 24/7. All that is needed is an Internet connection and the desire to get started! www.nelnetsolutions.com/dantes/

DLRSA

We discussed the DANTEs Distance Learning Readiness Self-Assessment (DLRSA), developed to give Service members the opportunity to assess their skills and identify possible weaknesses that may affect their success when taking distance learning classes. This is a no-cost benefit that can be found on our Web site at www.dantes.doded.mil/service-members/prep-for-college/self-assessment/index.html.

SOC

We promoted Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges (SOC), a benefit designed to help Service members and their families who otherwise would be unable to pursue a college education due to the frequent moves that occur over a military career. It is a benefit only offered to Service members and their families and the contract is managed for the DoD by DANTEs. A SOC student agreement between academic institutions can help save members considerable time and money. The SOC Degree Network System (DNS) is a consortium of over 1,900 accredited institutions, and many times they are able to waive academic residency requirements and apply ACE recommended credits Service members have earned from both non-traditional and traditional sources to their degree plan. www.soc.aascu.org

In closing, the Service Member and Veteran Academic Advising Summit was a great experience and we were excited to have the opportunity to share the DANTEs message and engage in important dialogue concerning strategies for expanding the reach of educational opportunities for active duty Service members and severely injured military Veterans.


Downrange at Qatar Camp As Sayliyah

My time here at Camp As Sayliyah has been a truly remarkable experience. I am happy to have had the chance to see the side that many of us at Headquarters know so very little about. The downrange experience for me took some getting used to. 
