

National Test Centers: 102 locations and growing


NTC: The winning acronym for 2009. Is there anyone out there not yet familiar with the benefits of a National Test Center (NTC)? Not seeing the value in starting one up? Or not taking advantage of it wherever possible?

Migrating DSST and CLEP paper-based testing to computer-based testing has been a hot trend in the past few years and is made possible through a partnership with the on-base colleges and the testing agency.

Additionally, there is an initiative to provide certification programs through Pearson VUE.

The number of NTCs is quickly rising as Education Center staff and Service members take advantage of the many benefits of computerized testing.

More than a hundred military installations are now providing computer-based DSST and CLEP testing. Not only does it provide increased security in exam delivery, but candidates enjoy greater flexibility in scheduling and receive instant score results after testing



– no more waiting for test results to come in the mail.

Additionally, Test Control Officers (TCO) can focus their efforts on goals and tasks rather than paper form ordering, administering, shipping and inventory – all the while maintaining confidence that Service members’ educational goals are being met.


Finally, for the institution hosting the NTC, it maximizes computer usage and generates funding to

maintain and operate its facilities.

With the simple, standard start-up process in place – an MOU between base and school and a written agreement between the school and the testing agencies – DANTES encourages all bases to explore this opportunity and reach out to schools on or near bases to sponsor iBT DSST and CLEP eCBT testing. Sample forms, guidance and technical support are available from DANTES. Troops to Teachers program gets 'lift' from state of Florida

Florida Governor Charlie Crist recently unveiled a new effort to encourage America's brave military Service men and women to enlist as educators in the state's neediest schools.

For the next nine months, more than 40 billboards throughout Florida will display information about the Troops to Teachers (TTT) program, a federally funded referral and placement assistance service that helps military personnel begin new careers as public school teachers.

"Veterans and members of our armed forces have a wealth of knowledge and experience that makes them ideal candidates to become educators in our schools," said Crist. "This valuable program provides them with an opportunity to continue to serve their country through the development of our most precious resource, our children."

Under the program, qualified participants receive a stipend of up to \$5,000 to pay for teacher certification requirements or a bonus of \$10,000 if they become employed in a high-need school. Participants who accept the financial assistance must teach for a minimum of three years. The program is open to retirees, active-duty personnel leaving the service with six or more years of service and Reserve/National Guard personnel with 10 or more years of credited service. Active-duty personnel can register if they are within one year of separation or retirement.

Joining Crist at the announcement were Eric J. Smith, Commissioner of Education; retired Rear Adm. LeRoy Collins Jr., Veterans Affairs Executive Director; Jeffrey Cropsey, Director of the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support; and Charlotte Brand Audie, CEO and President of the Florida Outdoor Advertising Association.

"I salute Dr. Smith and the Florida Department of Education for helping to advocate for Florida's veteran

community," said Rear Admiral Collins. "Experience shows that former military members make excellent public school teachers. This initiative will help highlight the opportunity for continued service for many of our nation's veterans."

Collins introduced Jeffrey Cropsey, DANTES Director, who addressed the group on the Troops To Teachers Program.

Cropsey commented on the success of the program and characterized it as "an example of how government works best in providing top quality teachers for our children while providing second careers for veterans."

The Troops to Teachers program was created in 1993 and is managed by the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES). Florida is the second largest employer of TTT participants and has employed 869 since the program started.

The state of Texas employs the most TTT participants.

Bill McAleer, who heads the TTT program for DANTES, said many of the billboards will be placed near military installations.

"By placing the billboards where troops and retirees live and work, we hope to reach those individuals who always seem to miss our message of 'Proud to Serve Again,'" said McAleer. "I would like to thank Ron Burton, the Florida TTT State

Manager and Charlotte Brand Audie for the work and effort they put into this project."

McAleer went on to say that while the billboards direct individuals to the TTT office in Florida, all state offices follow the policy of "we recruit for the nation and we service our state."

"While this may appear as an exclusively Florida campaign, the results will go far beyond its borders."

The Moanalua School for Continuing Education provides funding for the program. Classes are conducted on Fort Shafter and convene five times each year. The classes also are open to civilians.



Explore education and career opportunities with Kuder

The Kuder® Career Planning System (KCPS), an online education and career-planning tool, has been a staple of the DANTES counseling department for several years. In addition to the three research-based assessments covering interests, skills and work values, the KCPS has many system features that are designed to help individuals meet their long-term career and education goals.

Career Assessment

When individuals sign up for the KCPS, they take the career assessments, and from there, explore a world of opportunities in different postsecondary institutions, colleges and potential careers. It gives the most updated and accurate results from the O*Net occupation exploration site.

Job Resources

In addition to extensive searches, the KCPS also prepares individuals for life beyond postsecondary school with job resources such as Resume Builder, Job Interview Planning and the lifelong Online Career Portfolio. Using the Resume Builder, individuals can build and store different resumes in a variety

of formats and send them directly from their portfolio to prospective employers or their counselor.

With Job Interview Planning resources, individuals can view potential interview questions, learn what to expect from an interview and the interview process, as well as a list of questions to ask employers. Online Career Portfolio access starts when an individual registers with the KCPS and continues throughout their entire education and career journey, for lifelong access. At any point, users can log back into the system utilize all the components and view assessment results.

Person Match

One of the most unique components of the KCPS is the Person Match Feature. Person Match is found within the Kuder Career Search with Person Match (interest inventory) Report. Once results from the assessment have been compiled, users are provided a list of Person Match sketches or biographies. It's more than just a job description, however. Person Match takes away titles and gives users a view of the person behind the job. A Person Match profile may

include the person's education, likes and dislikes about their job, how it fits their personality and the day-to-day work they do. Instead of outlining a generic job description, Person Match is an intimate look at a real person's career and why it's important to them. Individuals can relate to this and begin to consider careers outside the norm.

Database Management System

Administrators, educators and counselors also have access to the Administrative Database.

Management System is a tool for viewing individual or aggregate data that can be converted into customized reports that highlight assessment results, education level, ethnicity and gender for all registered users. Administrators also can use the database to monitor individual progress by reviewing assessment results and help guide individuals on the right career path.

Excelsior College changes testing policies

Effective Feb. 1, Excelsior College has changed its testing policies to reflect students' efforts by shortening eligibility periods for examinations.

Andrea Lucas, Assistant Dean for Testing and Psychometric Services, Excelsior College, states, "Our exam students are learning faster, testing more quickly and achieving their educational goals with impressive motivation."

For staff members who communicate regularly with students about examinations, it's crucial to stay well-informed of these changes as inquiries are received.

Beginning this month, the test eligibility period for Excelsior College Examinations (ECEs) will be shortened from nine months to six months – from the time of registration for an exam.

Likewise, the test eligibility period, in which a corresponding practice exam can be taken, will be shortened from 120 days to 90 days from the date of a practice exam registration.

Registrations for examinations and practice exams completed prior to February 1, 2009, will NOT be affected by this change.

Excelsior College is notifying students of the pending change with the following measures:

- * A broadcast e-mail was sent to students on January 21.

- * Excelsior College's online examination pages have been updated

- * EC Central was updated as of January 21.

- * Notification to external stakeholders (DANTES, test preparation providers, etc.) was sent on January 21.

- * A notification of the change also will be inserted into the exam registration packet.

These changes reflect research that shows the majority of students already test within six months for an examination, and within 90 days for a practice exam.

Excelsior College representatives say they are confident that this change will provide students and test takers with a more positive academic experience, not to mention a greater return on their academic investment.
