

Paper-based testing operations gets new home

DANTES bids farewell to many of the staff at Prometric's office in Princeton, N.J., where CLEP, DSST, GRE, PRAXIS and SAT exams have been processed for DANTES since 1974.

Prometric recently transitioned its DANTES program operations for paper-based testing to St. Paul, Minn., and the process has been incredibly seamless.

Starting in October 2008, with the release of the 2009 Version of the DANTES Examinations Program Handbook (DEPH), Test Control Officers (TCOs) should use the new contact information:

Currently, all correspondence – returned exams, answer sheets and phone calls – are being forwarded from the Princeton office to St. Paul.

In the new location, Prometric already is printing, shipping and receiving paper exams and answer sheets; scoring answer sheets; issuing transcripts; and responding to TCO and examinee questions.

DANTES is in the process of modifying addresses on all applicable forms used for the CLEP, DSST, GRE, PRAXIS and SAT exams.

Prometric recently described their moving procedures to DANTES. The staff double wrapped and taped all envelopes, and the moving van was under secure observation at all times. Prometric accomplished the transfer without any problems.

Actually, it was only recently the DANTES staff

became aware that the move had been progressing in small steps over the past three years. We are happy to report there have been no interruptions in services.

Also, Prometric is prepared to continue their process of forwarding mail, phone and fax contacts for many years to ensure no loss of customer service occurs. Prometric has assured DANTES that Test Site service will not be impacted.

The New Jersey Prometric staff is training the members of the Minnesota office who will assume their duties. Diane Acker, Operations Manager for DANTES Exams, has made many trips to St. Paul to provide hands-on training. Acker will remain with the Prometric staff through October

2008 to ensure all of the inventory management protocols are in place and facilitate the DEPH chapter update process. Acker has worked with DANTES exams for the past 19 years.

The DANTES staff certainly will miss her continuous world-wide support to all the TCOs and Education Center staff, as well as the men and women who have taken exams and received her assistance throughout the years. She has been incredibly helpful to so many.

DANTES welcomes the St. Paul Prometric staff and hopes to continue the same level of customer service to TCOs, Education Center staff and Service members throughout the world.

Ohio schools offering in-state tuition to veterans, spouses and dependents

Veterans, as well as their spouses and dependents, can become "honorary Ohioans" and receive in-state tuition rates at the state's 36 public colleges and universities – even if they weren't born there or don't reside there.

For years Ohio has had a net-migration loss, and the Ohio G.I. Promise program is designed to reverse this trend by attracting

more people to the state and encouraging them to stay in Ohio after graduation. Currently, Ohio has about 470,000 students enrolled in their public institutions. Ohio's



strategic plan is to enroll about 230,000 more over the next 10 years.

Eric Fingerhut, Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents, would like veterans to know the state wants them to come to Ohio and thinks they are "incredibly valuable, high-potential students."


"We already have a number of very good programs, which we'll be expanding, to provide the type of counselors, advisers, and mentors who can work one-on-one with veterans to help them make the transition to civilian life and navigate the academic environment," Fingerhut said.

Here, in one place, they provide a complete listing of not only federal and state financial benefits, but all the privately funded programs (1,300 in all) as well.

These funds are for applicants at any level (high school through post doctorate).

Some examples include:
❖ \$1,000 a year to college students whose parents served overseas


❖ \$1,000 for veterans who served in the Marine Corps

The directory provides a set of indexes that let you search for funding by program title, sponsoring organization, geographic coverage and subject focus. The book contains 477 pages in a hardbound cover. The order limit is 1 per year.






Lakenheath now FAA CBT site

Another Computer-Based Test (CBT) Site has been activated by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Lakenheath, U.K., can now administer a variety of FAA tests.

Lakenheath's opening of FAA computerized testing expands the overseas military test locations to two in Europe – the other being Ramstein, Germany. The Air Force base at Yokota, Japan, also offers FAA computer-based testing.

Recent information from FAA on the closing of several commercial testing locations suggests there is an increased need for additional military locations in overseas settings, as well as some areas in CONUS. FAA tests are available to Service members at no cost at DANTES Test Sites.

Gas prices drive distance learning

One of the themes that emerged at a summer institute in San Francisco sponsored by the University Continuing Education Association (UCEA) is that higher gasoline prices will continue to “fuel” the increase in distance learning (DL) program enrollments that have been on the rise in recent years.

Summer enrollments are generally flat at Villanova University’s engineering school, but this past summer the school had a 40 percent increase in online enrollments that was attributed to “huge gas prices,” according to Sean O’Donnell who runs the engineering school’s distance education program.

At Victoria College in Texas, an informal poll shows that 42 percent



of students plan to take online courses because of gas prices.

This is another reason that many students are opting to go the distance learning route, especially if they already have the necessary equipment readily available in their homes.

DEPH for FY09 available October 1

The FY09 DANTES Examination Program Handbook (DEPH) Complete Version, Parts I and II, along with the DEPH Abridged Version, are scheduled to be available online Oct. 1, 2008.

DANTES testing personnel with password access to the Exams Management Information System (EMIS) will be able to access parts I and II of the DEPH online at <http://www.dantes.doded.mil> under the Academic Examination Programs and Education Staff Information tabs.

In addition to the FY09 DEPH, the calendar of national test dates

for FY09 and the online Document Receipt and Annual Testing Facilities Review forms also are available under EMIS.

Be advised, the DEPH is no longer available on CD-ROM.

Individuals without EMIS access may view the DEPH Part I Abridged Version under the Academic Examination Programs and Education Staff Information tabs.

ACT yearly test cycle to end soon

The last valid testing month for the 2007-2008 ACT Assessment (Form 62B) is October 2008.

Do not administer this test after Oct. 31. The ACT testing program uses one test form during their yearly test cycle (Nov. 1 – Oct. 31).

ACT will start the new test form cycle beginning Nov. 1 with ACT Form 62A. The new form is valid Nov. 1, 2008 – Oct. 31, 2009.

For those who will be administering the new 2008-2009 ACT Assessment in November, DANTES recommends returning the 2007-2008 ACT as early in October as possible. ACT will not ship the new test form until the old one is received and the inventory is reconciled. Additionally, DANTES EMIS Web DATIP inventory users will need to mark these old exams as “returned” in the electronic inventory system.

As a reminder, ACT requires that test booklets and unused answer folders be returned to one address and completed answer folders and Supervisor’s Report Forms sent to a different address. See the DEPH Part II, Chapter 2, for the correct addresses. The DEPH is available through your DANTES EMIS Web DATIP account.

ACT is sending you information concerning the return of the old form and shipment of the new one.

From the Advisor's Desk

The Post 9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act

The Post 9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act provides increased education benefits for qualified veterans.

These benefits include tuition paid at a rate not to exceed the highest in-state public institution of higher education, as well as a monthly housing allowance and up to \$1,000 annually for books, supplies and tutors.

Eligibility will be based on time served since September 11, 2001, and includes members who previously declined MGIB or VEAP.

The only contribution required to qualify for benefits is service. The housing allowance is not payable to individuals taking distance learning or for those

pursuing training at half time or less.

If a private institution's tuition exceeds the most expensive in-state tuition and fees at a public institution of higher learning in the veteran's state, Service

members can still attend.

In instances where the benefit level does not cover the cost of established charges, the Veterans Administration and the educational

institution may enter into an agreement to cover the unmet expenses under the "Yellow Ribbon Program" – a cost share agreement between the institution and the VA to cover excess tuition costs.

Active duty members can use this benefit to pay tuition not covered by tuition assistance.

Active Duty members are not eligible for the housing allowance, the stipend or the "Yellow Ribbon Program" portion of the benefit.

This is an incredible education benefit that will have a lasting impact on the Services for years to come. As with any new benefit, it will take a while for all of the details to be fleshed out, including

transferability and the necessary procedures to access this benefit.

The benefit does not go into effect until August 2009, so expect a lot of information to trickle out over the next several months. For the

Test deadline is approaching

The deadline for National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) and ACT to receive test orders for the November administration cycle is Sept. 23, 2008. Candidates must complete registration forms specific to testing at a DANTES Test Site.

Price increasing for SAT, CLEP

For individuals paying for their SAT exams, please note that the cost will increase from \$43 to \$45 effective October 1, 2008.

The cost of CLEP eCBT exams administered at On-Campus National Test Centers (NTCs) also has increased from \$65 to \$70. This change became effective July 1, 2008.

For On-Base NTC CLEP eCBT administrations, the fee has increased from \$85 to \$90, which includes the test and administration fee.

DANTES continues to fund tests for eligible military and civilians, and these price increases do not affect CLEP paper-based test titles at DANTES Test Sites.

The "21 Century GI bill" recently was signed into law and provides veterans the financial means to attend any public college in the nation, in addition to benefits for those who choose to attend private colleges. Army to grow its own high school graduates

Faced with a shrinking pool of eligible young recruits, the Army is getting into the business of granting diplomas at its own homegrown high school.

In a pilot program scheduled to begin this month at Fort Jackson, S.C., qualifying high school dropouts will start a four-week curriculum at the new Army Preparatory School to earn a general equivalency diploma.

Within a few months, the GED program will expand and students in those classes will earn a fully accredited high school diploma that will be recognized as equal to a diploma from any American high school.

The Army is working with new legislation in South Carolina to obtain accreditation as a charter high school. Later, the Army hopes to expand accreditation to other states so that Soldiers enrolled in the prep school can get a diploma from their original high school. All of it will be in exchange for a minimum enlistment in the Army, including any bonuses that apply to the Soldier's military occupational specialty, just before the new Soldier goes through basic combat training. Recruiting for the program began in mid-July.

"I'm stoked about it. It's a big deal," said Gen. William S. Wallace, commander of Training and Doctrine Command, whose subordinate Accessions Command is spearheading the effort.

"There are young people out there ... we can make fully qualified by doing something different, and this is something different," he said.

According to initial rough estimates, Wallace said, there could be as many as 300,000 people who meet eligibility criteria for the prep school.

Wallace has sounded the alarm for the past two years about the waning eligibility of people between the ages of 17 and 24.

Studies and focus groups cited by Wallace show that only 28 percent of people in that age group meet the Army's physical, intellectual and moral criteria for enlistment.

He sees the prep school program "as an opportunity to get at a segment of the population we can't get at right now."

"Whether it raises that 28 percent makes very little difference to me, as long as we can get all the young people who are smart but not educated and encourage them to get the education our society values and use that education in their future life, and part of that is a stop in the Army for three years or 30," Wallace said.
